Day 7 – Development project – 4 Plots of Land Audit

Today we had four plots of land to analyze. We were asked to identify the best and apply all that we had learned to correct the worst. One of the plots easily revealed its shortcomings and we could immediately identify the "Wind gap" facing it. Not a good feature no matter which way you looked at it.



At our favorite plot, the one with the best Feng Shui, we were bitten by mosquitos. This is what happens when you tread into mountain jungle. Recommendation for all Feng Shui practitioners and clients searching for the right plot of land, apply repellent before land-selection audits.



The perfect plot has a perfect-height Table and Rising Mountain, and also supported by Tortoise and Ancestral Mountains behind. Although the Tiger embrace was more obvious, it was still sentimental. In land selection, the wind and soil are also good indicators of the quality of the land. The assessment is based on understanding nature's design of mountains and water. This allows you to tell the condition of the Qi influencing the land. One section of the Graduate Master Practitioner course material was devoted to identifying "Landform Sha Qi & Sheng Qi" just observing certain clues. Of course, my favorite was the Qing Nang Jing's 10 Essential which covers 10 important key points from the Green Satchel Classics.





In the afternoon we had our last lecture which was on Date Selection. When is the best time to open a new vein? How do we renovate on the Grand Duke or Five Yellow when we have no other choice?
